



# Drainage and Lot Grading

As spring is a distant yet growing dream, we can start to think about flowing water once again and all the wonderful things that it can do to our homes, yards, and streets.

Starting up high we have snow on the roof, and ice in the gutters and downspouts. This can lead to problems if the water cannot flow. The warm start to winter introduced melt water into the rain gutters and downspouts, which then turned to ice out of the direct sunlight. This blockage usually melts away as the days get warmer. However, if a quick blast of heat hits, new melt water can find the path blocked by the old ice and lead to problems. Check the downspouts for ice blockages and try to tap them free with a wood block or rubber mallet. If the pipe can be removed easily, place it in a sunbeam or other warmer spot and the ice should come loose. Ice can damage this vital equipment, so make sure to do a visual inspection each spring and call in a repair company if anything looks to be in bad shape.



Once the water is on the ground it needs to be directed to the street or back alleyway. The City requires that all properties shed water to the public right-of-way. In other words, it is against City bylaws to allow water from your property to flow onto your neighbour's property. It is also against City bylaws to allow ponding of water on your property or against your foundation. It doesn't matter WHEN your home was constructed, you have a constant responsibility to ensure proper drainage. Most lots in Grovenor should (did?) have a high point in the middle of the property. Over time changes in the landscaping, or natural settlement of the ground can cause the water to flow in new directions, or not flow at all. This is when you get problems. Standing water will soak down into the ground causing more settlement or flooding of your basement or the neighbour's. Changing these pathways or ponds is big work, but it is not expensive work compared to flood damage or foundation damage. It is also an obligation on the part of the property owner, so ignorance is not a defense. Larger trees can impact drainage and foundations. Drought and large trees absorbing ground water can also cause drying and settlement of the clay beneath the soil, causing low spots. City drains and alleys are not impervious to such impacts and can stop doing their job. The City should be informed and held to account to make sure the water flows on their property too. Take a walk around in the rain this spring and observe where the water runs and where it pools: hopefully your answer is "in the river".

New builds (infill) have particular drainage issues. These homes are bigger, catching more rain on the roof and discharging that onto the ground. The basements are deeper, resulting in big excavations that extend to the side property lines. Residential builders are not required to compact the backfill, so there is a lot of settlement around these homes. This can cause settlement issues for 2-10 years depending on the conditions specific to that house. There is very little education of these risks to new home buyers on the part of the builders. You should be very careful about landscaping and other improvements (decks or patios) built near to the foundation of an infill home. The settlement of the void spaces down to undisturbed soil can take years and cannot be satisfied by surface compaction with a plate tamper (as some might claim). Compaction of clay is only achieved on a residential scale in layers of 6", so a 100-pound plate tamper on top of 10 feet is doing nothing. The voids are large air pockets, as we can see in this photo, chunks of frozen clay bigger than basketballs are pushed into the trenches, leaving as much as 30-40% of the volume as air. As the soil thaws, water/gravity work on these voids causing them to collapse. If 30% of the depth is void, then on average 2-3 feet of settlement could occur. If you are lucky, the soil conditions and spring thaw made short work of it and the builder fixed it all up. Summer/fall backfill should have been with less chunky material, resulting in fewer voids. This results in less dramatic settlement, but that is a false positive as it now takes longer to compact by natural means. At my own home I have measured a settlement of 8-10" over the past 10 years, resulting in the complete re-installation of a patio. Such settlement can impact sidewalks and fences placed on or near this poorly compacted



material.

The last issue is differences in elevation or ground levels from one lot to the other. In this case it is a requirement of the higher property to install retaining walls and drainage swales (ditches) to channel water to the public land. Many such efforts are half-hearted and not going to last long or work well in extreme weather. If you are suddenly at the "bottom of the hill" realize it is not your problem and that the City will enforce in your favour.

## **“Ch”: A Friendly Neighbourhood Café**

**CH-Cafeteria on the corner of 148th Street and Stony Plain Road.** is making its mark and melting hearts with exquisite hand-crafted chocolates and small batch coffee from Brave Fox. Due to several Covid-19 setbacks, it wasn't until last October that **CH** finally opened its doors to patrons of mostly the walk-in variety, all the while successfully adjusting to ever-changing pandemic protocols. I sat down with owner **Diego Viamontes**, originally from Mexico City, and he shared his journey.

**Alex: How did the name CH-Cafeteria come about and the decision to serve coffee as well as specialty chocolates?**

**Diego:** We wanted to leave the way it is pronounced open to conversation; we like how people are figuring out the “**ch**” -- a common sound in Spanish: “Chilangos (a native of Mexico City), “Chilaquiles (tortilla dish). We have two chocolatiers as partners, my wife Sara and I handle Brave Fox Coffee roasted by a family in Beaumont. If you compare flavour palettes of wine versus coffee, coffee is a hundred times more complex. (This is true!)

**Alex: How does your shop differ from other chocolate suppliers?**

Diego: Our chocolatier friends had a dream to open a shop but not a “shoebox store”. Our chocolates are visible, accessible. We don't like the perception that you might feel afraid to ask about chocolate like in other shops; here you can try our high-quality chocolate in a cozy space, get a coffee and eat comfortably in the shop. The chocolate world is small, everyone in the industry knows each other and what we are doing, so we have an idea and reference point to do something different. We try to make special products for those special dates and festivities: Valentine's Day was big, like Christmas chocolate marshmallow snowmen, our chocolatiers are always thinking of a treat for each holiday or event.

**Alex: Talk about the local arts and crafts displayed in CH...**

We're using the space to support local crafters and artists, they have a place to display, sell their work and they can get friends to visit, have a coffee or chocolate and it's a win-win for everyone.

**Diego, you are also officially on the Edmonton Football Club! How did this transpire?**

CFL 2.0 they call it, is an extension partnership in 2019 with Mexico France and Germany; with players having a chance to play in the CFL, Edmonton selected me and I passed the elimination process of the training camp, then chosen to play wide receiver and punt return on their roster.

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

# Urban Coyote Intervention Program

The Urban Coyote Intervention Program at the University of Alberta invites volunteers from neighbourhoods in Edmonton to participate in community-based aversive conditioning of urban coyotes. The goal of this program is to increase wariness in coyotes that occupy residential neighbourhoods.

It is looking for 20 participating neighbourhoods and has identified 40 neighbourhoods with high past rates of coyote reports. The program will train volunteers to use weighted, flagged tennis balls and an umbrella with an image of a wolf face to frighten coyotes in these neighbourhoods. These actions are intended to frighten coyotes, but not injure them.

Use of similar techniques, known as hazing or aversive conditioning, is widely recommended by wildlife managers to reduce habituation by animals to people and avoid the subsequent need for more damaging tools, including lethal management.

Alberta's provincial and national parks make extensive use of aversive conditioning of bears to teach them greater wariness and reduce conflict with people. These approaches work best when combined with control of food attractants. Learn more and volunteer at:



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
